BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

Andreas Markantonatos, BA Athens, MA Oxon, DPhil Oxon, is an Associate Professor of Greek at the Department of Philology in the University of the Peloponnese and Departmental Head. Earlier on he was Adjunct Lecturer in Greek at the University of Crete and Lecturer in Greek at the University of Patras. His research has ranged over Attic drama, Narratology, Greek Religion and Mythology. Andreas Markantonatos' books include Tragic Narrative: A Narratological Study of Sophocles' Oedipus at Colonus (Berlin & New York, 2002), Oedipus at Colonus: Sophocles, Athens, and the World (Berlin & New York, 2007), and Euripides' Alcestis: Narrative, Myth, and Religion (Berlin & New York, 2013). A recipient of the Academy of Athens award for the best monograph in the Humanities (2008), he has edited seven multi-authored volumes on Attic drama and related subjects, including Brill's Companion to Sophocles (Leiden & Boston, 2012), and has published widely on Greek literature and modern literary theory. As well as preparing an annotated edition of Euripides' Suppliant Women, he is currently working on a large-scale narratological study of Euripides' Heracles.
